Reported Speech module 3 of 3

Look at the following examples:

- a) She asked **if** I was a Bengali. (original yes-no question: 'Are you a Bengali?')
- b) The waiter asked **whether** we wanted a table near the window. (original yes-no question: 'Do you want a table near the window?)
- c) He asked me **if** I had come by train or by bus. (original alternative question: 'Did you come by train or by bus?')
- d) *direct speech*: 'Do you work from home?' he said. reported speech: *He asked me if I worked from home*.
- e) *direct speech:* 'Could you write that down for me?' she asked. reported speech: *She asked me if I could write it down.*
- -When reporting yes/no questions ie... questions that don't begin with 'wh', if/whether is added.
- helping verbs (auxiliary) such as:
 can, could, may, might, will, would, shall are used in the beginning of the question.
- 'to be verbs' such as is, am, are, was, were, have, had are also used to begin such questions.
- Their answers can be a simple yes / no.

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Work hard.

Go away.

Help.

Stop it.

When we report an imperative sentence, we use 'to'.

- The master said to Supandi, 'Get me something to drink.' (*Direct speech*)

 The master told Supandi to get him something to drink. (reported speech)
- 'Go away,' Laxmi Bai told them. (*Direct speech*)

 Laxmi Bai told them to go away. (reported speech)
- 'Be careful,' I told him. (*Direct speech*) *I told him to be careful*. (reported speech)
